
Few people have had a more positive impact on Liberty Union High School athletics over the years than has Bill Bristow. He has been a constant advocate for the athletic programs of all the schools in the L.U.H.S.D. Bill was born in Arkansas and moved to Brentwood with his family as a small child. He attended Brentwood Elementary School from where graduated in 1949 after having been the school's Student Body President and winner of the American Legion Award. From 1949 to 1953 Bill attended L.U.H.S. and was active in student activities and sports. In 1949-50 he was the Freshman Class President, and in 1950-51 he was the Sophomore Class President. During the 1951-52 school year he was the Vice-President of the student body, and in 1952-53 he was elected the Student Body President. Bill was also very active in athletics at Liberty even though he had to work after school. He participated in track and won his J.V. letter. In 1951 he played halfback on the undefeated varsity football team that won the championship. In 1952 he again lettered in varsity football and was the co-winner of the Most Valuable Backfield Player Award. Bill was also a member of the Liberty Block "L" Society. He was a life member of the California Scholarship Federation and won the Bank of America Award for Liberal Arts at graduation.

Upon graduating from Liberty, Bill went to San Francisco State College for two years from 1953-55 where he was an honor student and was chosen as the Outstanding Sophomore Air Force Cadet. He then transferred to the College of Pacific in 1955 and graduated in 1958 with honors with a B.A. degree in history and carned his California Teaching Credential. While at Pacific he was president of the California Student Teachers Association and a life member of Phi Kappa Phi Academic Honor Society. He returned to San Francisco State College for graduate work and received his M.A. degree in 1963 in Educational Administration. Bill's outstanding educational career began in 1958 when he was bired as an 8th grade teacher, Vice-Principal and coach at Knightsen Elementary School. From 1963 to 1965 he was Superintendent/Principal of Knightsen School. He served as the Director of Federal Projects for Liberty Union High School District from 1965-67. In 1967, Bill was selected to be the Principal of Edna Hill School in the Brentwood Union School District.

In 1970 Bill was selected Superintendent of the Brentwood Union School District, and he continued in that position until his retirement in 1991. His services to the community are numerous and varied. He served on the Board of Directors of the Delta Memorial Hospital; he was a member of Local Draft Board 31; a member of the Contra Costa County Food Coalition Campaign Committee; Vice-President of the Brentwood Chamber of Commerce; he served Co-Chairman of the L.U.H.S.D. Bond Committee to build Freedom High School in Oakley; and he has served on the L.U.H.S.D. Athletic Hall

of Fame Board of Directors since its inception in 1991.

Bill's educational awards community recognition are many and reflect the love and caring of all who have known or worked with Bill. In 1976 the Bristow Theater on Edna Hill Campus was dedicated in his honor. He was



honored by the Brentwood Recreation and Parks District in 1991 for his many years of support for the youth of the The Brentwood Lions Club and Lions community. International selected him as a Melvin Jones Fellow for "Dedicated Humanitarian Services" in 1992. In 1995 he was recognized by the Contra Costa Chapter of the Association of California School Administrators as an "Outstanding Friend of Education." The acme of all recognition came in 1995 when the Brentwood Union School District named and dedicated the William B. Bristow Middle School in his honor. Bill's contribution to Liberty athletics throughout the years has been invaluable although mostly unrecognized due to his reticence to accept thanks or praise. He hired teachers at the elementary level who were able to coach and were encouraged to coach at Liberty. He allowed those professional educators to schedule their days so they could make athletic trips and practices at Liberty. Some of those coaches were Dick Martin from Knightsen and Jack England, Jerry Lilley, Alex Aiello, Floyd Reese, Jr., Patty Mantelli Serna, John Rodgers, Rich Barrios, Bill Usher, Greg Chappel, George Talman and Vic Thornhill from the Brentwood Union School District. Bill's famous question when interviewing teachers was always, "What else can you do for the community?" Bill also made Brentwood Union School District athletic facilities available to Liberty as needed when Liberty's athletic program was growing and ran into scheduling problems.

For his long service, dedication, loyalty and many contributions to Liberty athletics, it is fitting that William Bristow is inducted into the L.U.H.S.D. Athletic Hall of Fame.

Rick Fortner Athlete

Rick Fortner was an outstanding three sport athlete while at Liberty Union High School from 1967 to 1971. He was the Frosh M.V.P. in football in 1967 and went on to play three years varsity football culminating with his 1970 season when he was chosen All-E.B.A.L. 1st team on offense and 2nd team on defense. He played on the 1969 undefeated team. He was chosen to play in the 1971 Alameda-Contra Costa County All-Star Football game.

In the 1967-68 basketball season he earned his J.V. letter and was the Team Captain. In 1968-69, his sophomore season, he was Honorable Mention All-E.B.A.L. as a varsity player, and in 1969-70 he was 2nd team All-E.B.A.L.

He was the M.V. Baseball Player on the J.V. team in 1968 and Co-Captain of varsity team in 1969. He was a member of the 1970 baseball team that won the E.B.A.L. Championship. He also lettered in 1971.

When Rick graduated from Liberty in 1971 he was recruited by at least 10 colleges to play for them. He chose to attend University of California Davis where he concentrated on only one sport - football. Thus began one of the truly great stories in the history of U.C.D. football. As a freshman Rick was on the varsity team and immediately became an offensive force. As a frosh, he caught 16 passes for 210 yards and 4 touchdowns. As a sophomore, Rick won the Palmer S. Moody Award for the Outstanding Sophomore Player on the 1972 Far Western Conference Championship U.C. Davis team. He was voted to 2nd Team All-Far Western Conference as a tight end and made five receptions in the Boardwalk Bowl in Atlantic City, N.J. He caught 26 passes for 377 yards and 2 touchdowns.

In his junior season, he was used as both a fullback and a tight end. He rushed for 223 yards and caught 13 passes for 225 yards and 1 touchdown. He was selected to the All-Far Western Conference 1st Team as a tight end, and he was named to the little All-Coast 2nd team. He was also Honorable Mention little All-American. Rick was named the winner of the Jerry Norris Award for the Most Valuable and Most Inspirational Player on the 1973 U.C. Davis Championship team. He was captain of the special team for punts and kick-off coverage, and, more often than not, he was the first to make the tackle down field.

Rick suffered a near career ending injury in 1973 but came back as senior to lead the 1974 U.C. Davis team to an unprecedented 4th Far-Western Conference Championship as the Team Captain. In a season marred by injuries, he still managed 9 catches for 140 yards and one touchdown and carried the ball 6 times for 56 rushing yards.

Rick was again honored by being the winner of the Jerry Norris Award for the M o s Valuable and Most Inspirational Player. He was 1st team All-Far Western Conference as a tight end and was chosen 1974 Northern California College



Division Offensive Player of the Year. He was chosen to the 1st team little All-Coast Team and Honorable Mention little All-American. He was nominated to play in the East-West Shrine Game, but he had to decline because of a severe concussion injury. This injury also kept him out of the professional draft. Coach Jim Sochor said of Rick, "He's the only player we've ever had who played on four championship teams. He's won at least 8 games for us on his own ability in that time, and probably more than that." When Rick was selected Northern California Offensive Player of the year, Coach Sochor said, "I'm sure they picked him on the basis of what he has done for us for four years."

His career totals for four years of 54 receptions, 952 yards, and 8 touchdowns, two M.V.P. awards and two All-Conference selections plus two little All-Coast and two little All-American selections are a legacy that will be difficult to surpass. Because of his fantastic career at U.C. Davis from 1971-1974, he was selected as tight end on the All-Decade Aggies Team (1970-1979).


Rick graduated from U.C.D. with a B.A. degree in history. He now lives in Sacramento with his daughter, Anne. It is with a great deal of pleasure and pride that the L.U.H.S.D. Athletic Hall of Fame inducts Rick Fortner for his outstanding accomplishments to L.U.H.S. athletics and to U.C.D. football.

Dennis Pilati Athlete

Dennis Pilati attended Liberty Union High School from 1958 to 1962. During that time he was an outstanding athlete in three sports football, basketball, and baseball. During the 1958-59 school year he won his J.V. letter in all three sports. In football, Dennis earned three varsity letters at quarterback where he was noted as an outstanding ball handler and a fine passer. On the varsity basketball team, Dennis played as a guard and playmaker with a soft shooting touch. He lettered in 1959-60 and in 1961-62. He was Captain of the 1961-62 basketball team. Although Dennis was an excellent football and basketball player, it was in baseball where he really stood out as an exceptional athlete. He earned his varsity letter for three years, and in his junior year of 1961, he pitched a one-hit game against Livermore. In his senior year he pitched two no-hit games - against John Swett and Amador. He was selected All-E.B.A.L. in 1962 as well as being selected as Liberty's Most Valuable Player.

Upon graduation from Liberty Dennis attended Fresno State College from 1962 to 1967 and continued his outstanding baseball career. In his frosh season of 1963 he earned his J.V. letter and was moved to the varsity team in his sophomore year. During the summer of 1964 Dennis played semi-professional baseball for Eureka in the Humboldt County League. He pitched two no-hit games and was selected the league's Most Valuable Player. He earned his varsity letter at Fresno State in 1964, 1965, and 1966. In 1966 he recorded two one-hit games - against the University of Nevada Remo and San Fernando State College. He was selected as a 1st Team All-C.C.A.A. Performer in 1966 while posting a perfect 7-0 season record and setting a Fresno State record for the lowest earned-run-average (E.R.A.) that has lasted for 27 years. He also led the league in won-loss percentage and E.R.A. that same season on a Fresno State team that was ranked number five in the nation. Dennis pitched

in the district playoffs for the College World Series in 1966.



He graduated from Fresno State College in 1967 with a B.A. degree in education and a teaching credential. He was an assistant varsity baseball coach at the University of Pacific in 1968, and he received a M.A. degree in education from U.O.P. in 1968. Dennis presently lives in Discovery Bay and is the owner of a farm equipment dealership.

For his outstanding athletic record at Liberty Union High School and Fresno State College, the L.U.H.S.D. Athletic Hall of Fame is proud to induct Dennis Pilati.

1951 L.U.H.S. Football Team

The 1951 Liberty Lion East Bay Counties Athletic League Championship football team ranks as one of the finest teams to ever wear the cardinal and gold. The team was coached by Lou Bronzan with Jack Ferrill as his assistant coach. They were undefeated in regular season play with an 8-0-1 record; the tie was with Livermore a game in which Liberty had 2 touchdov/ns called back. The team scored 332 points to the opponent's 60. While they were a talented scoring machine, they were very stingy and mean defensively - giving up only 60 points to their opponents. They were the highest scoring team in Northern and Central California in 1951, and at the end of the season, the team was ranked first in Northern California in its division. The team averaged 338 yards per game and held their opponents to 143 yards. Ed Douglas was the leading scorer with 91 points followed by Zuly Mendoza with 66 points and Ruben "Snake" Gutierrez with 42 points. The quarterbacks, Alfred Pedersen and Frank Domingo, completed 48 out of 68 passes. Also, the team made 108 first downs to the opponent's 78. This team was blessed with a versatile and powerful running game and a very sophisticated passing attack. The team could strike with lightning speed by air or ground. Halfbacks Joe Torres and Zuly Mendoza could "freeze" their opponents with their speed and quickness. Fullback Ed Douglas could run over, around, or through most defenses. The quarterbacks often hit ends "Snake" Gutierrez or Dick Martin with passes for quick touchdowns or long gainers. The linemen were big, strong, tough and experienced and went both ways. Ed Douglas was chosen Most Valuable

Rochelle Ann Poerio Athlete

Shelley was an outstanding athlete in three sports while attending Liberty from 1975 to 1979. She competed in and won varsity letters in varsity basketball, cross country, and track and field. She also played J.V. volleyball and was selected "Rookie of the Year." In basketball she was selected a Parker-Robb Super Sport and made All-League and was the team captain that won the F.A.L. Championship and went on to the North Coast IIA playoffs. As a Frosh-Soph, Shelley was the F.A.L. Cross Country Champion, and she was the Most Valuable Cross Country Runner and Team Captain. Shelley really excelled in track which was her first love. She was two time winner of the F.A.L. Championship in the 440 yard dash. She was an important member of the 1978 L.U.H.S. Girls Track Team that went undefeated during the dual meet season and won the F.A.L. Girls Championship and the N.C.S. IIA Championship Meet. This team also won the Charlie Eaton Relays Team Championship. In 1979 Shelley was the Most Valuable Track Athlete and was the Team Captain. Shelley went to the State Track Meet in 1976 as a member of the mile relay team. She was chosen the Girl Athlete of the Week by the Contra Costa Times. She went to N.C.S. Finals in track for four years in the 440 yard dash. Shelley holds the school record in the 440 yard dash in :58.4 set in 1979 and the 880 yard run in 2:23.6 set in 1977. She was a member of the record holding 440 yard relay and the mile relay team which posted a 4:06.0 school record in 1978. As is the usual case with great athletes, they excel in many areas and are also very active in student body activities. Shelley was the L.U.H.S. Student Body President in her senior year, and before that, she served as Commissioner of Athletics. In 1979 Shelley was selected to the second five for Homecoming Queen. She was also active in the student council, Homecoming Committee, Pep Club, G.A.A., and the Girls' Block "L" Society. Shelley went on to Stanford University where she competed in track for four years and was the Team Captain of the Stanford University Women's Track Team as a senior.



She graduated from Stanford in 1983 earning a B.A. degree in communications. She is currently living and working in Walnut Creek where she is an investment executive.


Because of her outstanding athletic and academic careers at Liberty Union High School and Stanford University, the L.U.H.S.D. Athletic Hall of Fame is extremely proud to induct Rochelle Ann Poerio.

Nicole Simoni Athlete

Nicole Simoni ranks as one of the most versatile and outstanding athletes in the history of L.U.H.S. She was an accomplished athlete in three sports earning varsity letters for three years in volleyball, basketball and swimming. In volleyball she was the 1984 winner of the Most Improved Player award. In 1985-86 and again in 1986-87 she won the Co-Most Valuable Player award. In 1985-86 and 1986-87 she was chosen to the F.A.L. All-League First Teams both years, and in 1986-87 she was chosen to the North Coast Section-C.I.F. Volleyball All-Tournament Team. The Lions took third place in the IIA Volleyball North Coast Section Championship Tournament. She was a Liberty Athlete of the Week Award winner in volleyball in 1986. She also won the Albert D. Seeno Construction Co. Athlete of the Week Award in 1985, 1986 and 1987. Nicole was also Co-Captain of the team in 1986-87.

Nicole was also an outstanding performer for the L.U.H.S. swimming team. She was the Most Valuable Varsity Swimmer in both 1984 and 1985 and was chosen as Liberty Athlete of the Week in both the 1984 and 1985 seasons. She won the Seeno Athlete of the Week Award in 1985. She qualified in and swam in the 1984, 1985 and 1987 North Coast Swimming Championship meets.

As great as Nicole was in both volleyball and swimming, it was in basketball where she received the most accolades. As a sophomore in 1984-85 she played on the Liberty team that played in the North Coast Section Finals in Division II - taking second place and beating arch rival Campolindo five times to reach the finals. In 1985-86 and 1986-87 she was selected as the Varsity Co-Most Valuable Player. She was also chosen to the F.A.L. All-League First Team in 1985-86 and again in 1986-87. She was also chosen as the F.A.L. Co-Most Valuable Player in 1986-87. She was an All-Tournament Player in the Frank Stonebarger Tournament in 1985-86 and 1986-87 and was selected Liberty Athlete of the Week and a Seeno Award winner for basketball in 1986-87. Other acknowledgments during the 1986-87 season were being selected Big "C" Athlete of the Week for basketball and Oakland Tribune Player of the Week - basketball. The Liberty 1986-87 basketball team went on to the North Coast Section IIA playoffs.



Other awards received include the Brentwood News Female Scholar Athlete Nominee in 1984-85, the Golden State Warriors and GTE Sprint Prep Series -Outstanding Sportsmanship Award in 1985-86, and during the 1986-87 school year, she was chosen Brentwood Rotary Student of the Month for September and the Brentwood News Female Scholar Athlete finalist.

For her outstanding athletic prowess over four years, she was selected as the Liberty Yearbook Athlete of the Year in 1987.

Upon leaving L.U.H.S., Nicole went to the University of Pacific where she was a member of the women's varsity swim team for four years - 1987-1991. She graduated from U.O.P. in 1991 with a B.S. in business administration specializing in finance. She works as a financial advisor in Walnut Creek but continues to live in Brentwood.

It is with a great deal of pleasure and pride that the L.U.H.S.D. Athletic Hall of Fame inducts Nicole Simoni for her outstanding athletic accomplishments at L.U.H.S. and U.O.P.






